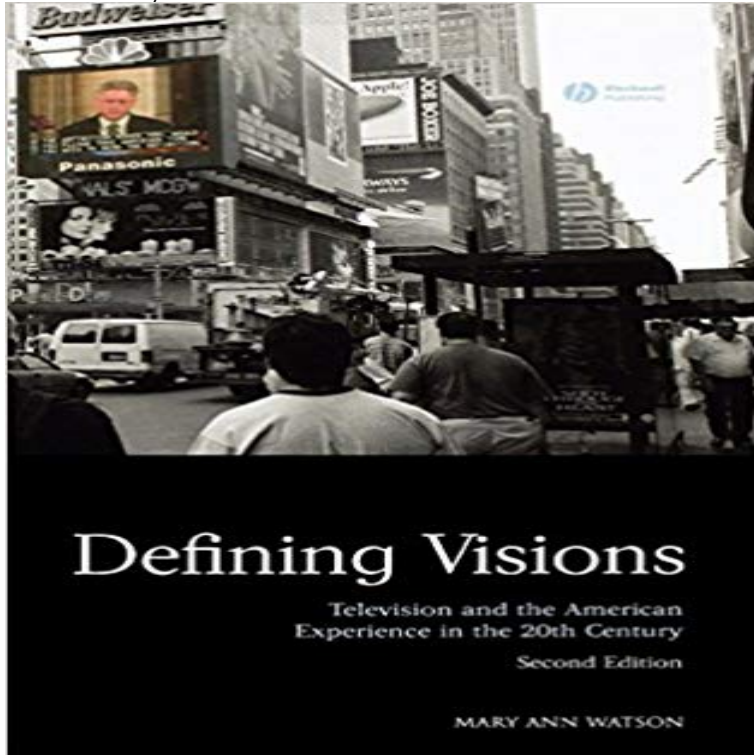


Defining Visions: Television and the American Experience in the 20th Century
