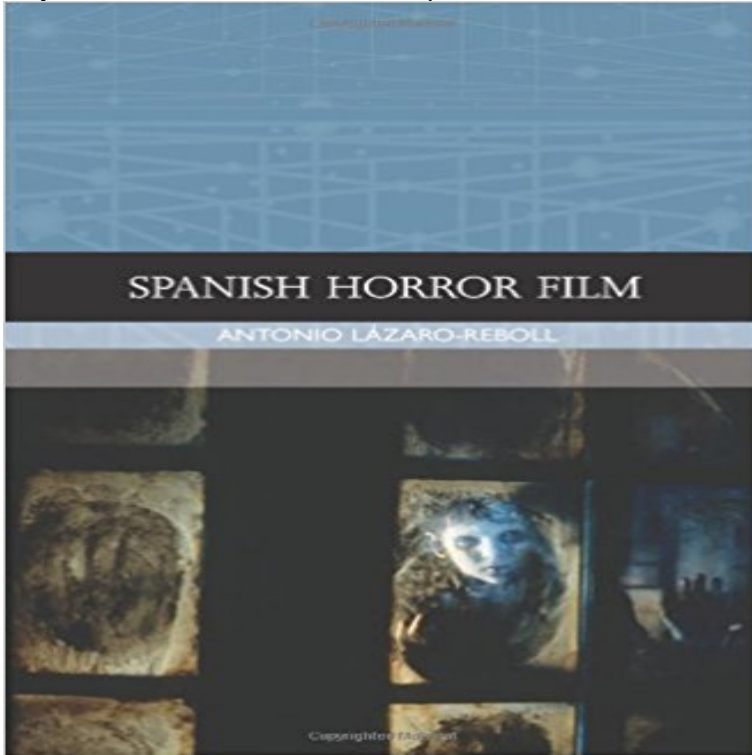


Spanish Horror Film (Traditions in World Cinema EUP)
